Rutland's return to ringing...

Most of Rutland's towers are ringing again with just a few exceptions, *Oakham All Saints* being one. A recent tower inspection highlighted significant problems, necessitating refurbishment and rebushing of the Treble, 3rd and 4th clappers. The leather bell pads need replacing on 4th, 5th and Tenor. Also necessary has been the removal of 7 of the 8 pulley boxes for a complete overhaul and rebuild. Work is scheduled for late September with a return to ringing sometime later.

The bells at *St John the Evangelist, Caldecott*, are also going to need some work and refurbishment. All six bells require rebushing of the clappers at some expense.

With the tower silent during the lockdowns Jackdaws were able to get into the tower, where they made nests and reared young. The resulting debris has been cleared but work is required to replace mesh to the windows to prevent a repeat situation. The required work isn't preventing ringing at the current time.

Barrowden, St Peter's are also unable to ring at the present time. There is a problem in the bell tower, a wooden louvre hanging precariously above the bells, making them unsafe for ringing. Hopefully this will be repaired soon and normal practice be resumed.

Tinwell, All Saints, also, has not yet resumed ringing.

Bell Maintenance - Funding Available

It is still warm outside, and there is probably enough time left in the season to make a trip up the Tower to check your Bells ... it is much more comfortable now than it will be in the cooler, wetter months of the year!

I last mentioned in this newsletter some of the simple checks and observations that can be made to keep everything running smoothly, and to catch any issues before they become serious. Now I would like to point out some of the help available from our Guild.

From Rutland Branch Chairman Committee Meeting Report

Dear Fellow Campanologist

Your Rutland Branch committee met this evening (Friday 3rd September) and a number of points arise which I am sure you will be interested to read.

1. Your committee are a collective of ringers and tower captains covering the Branch geographically and at all levels of ringing. A key discussion point tonight was around the return to ringing (after the various lockdowns), lessons learned and concerns.

- We all agreed the first time on a rope after the long break resulted in stiff shoulders and arms but these soon relaxed during or after ringing. You are in good company if you have felt the same.
- We would rather see ringers come to towers and wear face coverings (even ask others to wear coverings) rather than not ring. Tower captains should bear all ringers in mind and hopefully exclude nobody by accident. The onus is on each one of us to ring or not as we choose.

Ringing for weddings and funerals has commenced and most towers and bells have been checked beforehand. Ted Philips as Steward offers support if required.

2. We plan a publicity and recruiting drive when we see a suitable window. This will not be before Christmas with the current high numbers of positive covid tests. It is unfair on teacher and pupil to be less than a metre apart and facing each other during the "learn to bell handle" phase. We will next review matters in early December.

3. Subscriptions and Donations are down this year (NOT the retired members I should add) and your committee asks you to look at paying your subscription please. The bank details for transfer are:

Whilst there has been no expenditure so far this year, there are still Guild grants (for tower/bell improvements & maintenance) and as soon as we can a programme of ringing, tours and teaching will be arranged.

4. There are currently 3 or 4 vacancies on the committee and willing volunteers are always welcomed. We are especially looking to recruit someone (ringer or not) to assist with keeping the website up to date and accurate. In January Helen Pollard will not be standing for re-election as Honorary Secretary. 5. We thank all those who have returned to the tower. There have been so many positive comments about the bells ringing out in the County. This can only happen with your commitment, and now we need to redouble our efforts to recruit and teach as soon as we all feel more certain about the future and minimising the giving or receiving of covid-19.

CCCBR - An excerpt from President's Holiday Blog #41

"I must confess to having lied in my Outlook vacation autoresponder by saying I am trekking in the Himalayas with just a satellite phone to give me internet access. In fact, this holiday cottage in Northumberland has first-class internet access meaning work doesn't stop. I usually have fun making up holidays I haven't been on when sitting in the barber's chair. They don't really care, so why not just make it interesting?"

One project that has been ticking along quietly in the background is the new mobile belfry. The idea here is to have something that is easy to transport, quick to set up (30 mins), provides a realistic ringing experience, and looks the part. It will be part of a major push to get bells in front of more people – in schools, at music festivals, shopping centres, business parks. The Loughborough Bellfoundry Trust has very kindly agreed to give the bells themselves, and Charlie and I went up to Loughborough with Phil Gay (one of the architects of the [Lichfield Diocesan Mobile Belfry](#)) and Roger Booth (owner of the [Charmborough ring](#)) to test out one of the new bells. And it was absolutely superb! A really realistic bellringing experience from a very small bell. As there's nothing like a deadline to drive action, I'll have a micro website on the project available in two weeks' time.

What is the best short video that explains bellringing? It's not short at 48 minutes long, but I had never seen the film 'The Craft of Bellringing' until this week: <https://vimeo.com/georgeperrin>. Not great in the diversity stakes but it was made seven years ago. Just before lockdown, the Churches Conservation Trust had produced a publicity video on ringing of a similar professional production quality. It has not been released yet but hopefully they will relaunch their recruitment campaign in the new year. George Perrin has also now made his video tutorials for bellringers available via the online learning platform Udemy. It won't suit those who think ringing training should be free, but even if you only look at the sample videos on the site (<https://www.udemy.com/course/bellringing/>) you'll see some useful resources."
